She gets great joy in sharing her experiences and all she has learned with others who share the same passion for quilting. She is a Quilt in a Day Certified Instructor.

Sandy's workshop, "I Dreamed I was a Butterfly," is a new addition to her workshops. It is a butterfly table runner that features a technique called "Invisible Applique." The pattern

is required, but with this pattern you can make a wall hanging, table topper with 4 butterflies, an 18" pillow, or a

PATCHWORK BINGO

(Preparation for March Program)

Getting ready for Patchwork Bingo is almost as fun as playing the game since making your game "cards" ahead of time allows you to rediscover many of the great fabrics in your stash. The more cards you make, the more you can play, and the more chances to win. Or if you get carried away making Bingo "cards," you can share with friends.

GAME CARD INSTRUCTIONS:

Fabrics for 1 (10 ¹/₂") "card"

Each fabric must be chosen from one of the following categories: batik, floral, geometric, heart, leaf, holiday, novelty, paisley, plaid, solid, star, stripe, or 1930's prints. If you don't have a category in your stash don't fret, you will still have good opportunities for a "Bingo". Use a black print for the free center square. Cut from a $2\frac{1}{2}$ "-strip or fabric scraps:

- 5 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ squares from assorted yellow and orange prints
- 5 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ squares from assorted red prints
- 5 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares from assorted blue prints
- 5 2 ¹/₂" squares from assorted green prints
- 4 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares from assorted pink and purple prints
- 1 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ square from a black print (for the free center)

BLOCK ASSEMBLY:

- 1. Join 5 yellow/orange print squares to make one row. In the same manner, make 1 red, 1 blue, and 1 green row.
- 2. Join two pink/purple squares. Make 2 pink/purple pairs. Join one pink/purple pair to each side of the black square to complete the pink/purple row.



3. Join rows, placing the pink/purple row in the center to complete 1 Patchwork Bingo Game Card Block.

You will need to bring the completed item to the February meeting as proof it is finished. You will be able to put your name into the drawing for the basket as well as receive a charm. The regular general monthly meeting of the Antelope Valley Quilt Association was called to order on January 10, 2019, at 6:35 pm, President Kathy Greene being in the chair and Carolyn Lundie acting as secretary.

Kathy Greene reminded all to turn off cell phones and place purses and bags under chairs and to put away chairs after the meeting. Keep walkways clear.

Minutes: The minutes of the November meeting were approved as published in the December newsletter. Motion proposed by Lynn Aguirre and seconded by Cheryl Nieman. Motion passed

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's reports for November and December were approved as published in the January newsletter. Motion proposed by Yvonne Rodriquez and seconded by Stephanie Shuping. Motion passed.

Coral Brown showed examples of the Spider Web and Butterfly block.

Kathy described how to make a Patchwork Bingo Card and indicated directions are in the newsletter. 2nd Vice President (Jamie Harrington) stated a need for Committee Chairs for White Glove, Raffle Baskets, and Make and Take. Two vendors paid for 10'x30' spaces. Please give suggestions for other vendors to Jamie.

Spring Quilt Retreat (Betty Putzka) Sign-ups and a \$100 deposit are due tonight. Monday, April 15-17, 2019 are the dates. The location is Apples Bed and Breakfast in Big Bear. We'll have 3 classrooms and breakfast and afternoon snacks. Each person will have 2 tables with a lamp, chair, trash bag and drink holder.

Opportunity Quilt 2018-19 (Peggy Campbell)

Peggy reminded everyone that By-Laws state that members are required to buy \$20 of Opportunity Quilt Tickets. The Op. Quilt fits a queen-sized bed. Al's Vac and Sew donated a BabyLock Jazz Machine with many attachments. Pick up your tickets from Peggy. March 9th, Michele Cameron will take the Op. Quilt to the Ridgecrest Quilt show. Currently, sales for the Op. quilt are \$1000 and \$200 for the sewing machine. A 'Thank You' to Janet Knoblock for getting the Op. quilt into the craft show at Mayflower Gardens.

The regular board meeting of the AVQA was called to order at Bolts in the Bathtub on January 15, 2019 at 6:38 pm, President Kathy Greene being in the chair and Carolyn Lundie acting as secretary.

Minutes: The minutes of the November Board Meeting were approved as published in the December newsletter. Motion proposed by Jamie Harrington and seconded by Corinne Gurney. Motion passed.

President Kathy Greene announced that all is well.

Treasurer Peggy Vachon apologized for missing the General Meeting. She will pay for the Quilt Show venue in April.

Programs Co-Chair Coral Brown reported upcoming events were the same as reported at the January General meeting.

2nd VP (Ways and Means) Jamie Harrington: She has a new vendor, Creations by Chris from Idyllwild, CA. She hasn't heard from Dragonfly Dyeworks. McKnits' owner has said she's coming, but hasn't sent in the form. Quilt Show meeting is on the 29th of January at 6:30. The venue may change. Jamie needs these chairpersons for the quilt show: Set-up and Breakdown of the quilt show, transporting quilt racks, Security, White glove, Make and Take and Raffle Baskets. Jamie may not be at the next General Meeting due to a surgery. Corinne Gurney is Auction Chair. Sue Jacobsen will do the Excel spreadsheets for quilt entries. There will be 24-hour security. Jamie requests that all Friendship Groups donate a Raffle Basket. Karen Stocking is chairperson for the Boutique. A-1 Awards is going out of business and Jamie will try to get ribbons from the owner. Nette Louton and Pat Crook are doing admissions.

Discussion ensued whether vendors should be charged more for using the Square to pay for their space at the Quilt Show, as there is a large fee charged to the guild. No decision was reached.

Kathy Judkins responded to a question and stated that every vendor donates towards a raffle basket.

Jamie Harrington stated that she would call on April 1st regarding payment to the Fairgrounds for the quilt show.

Parliamentarian Corinne Gurney reported that she needs nominations for Treasurer and 1st Vice President for 2019-20. Jamie Harrington will be board representative for the Nominating Committee.

Travel/UFO Challenge Corinne Gurney Thirty-two members paid (\$25) for the Quilt in a Day trip and 36 are signed up for the free Hoffman Fabrics tour.

People who complete their monthly UFO Challenge will receive a small recognition gift and their name will be entered into a drawing for a basket at the end of the Challenge.

Publicity Kathy Judkins called Lancaster City Hall for the regulations regarding posting advertising signs within city limits. Signs can be posted on private property as large as 16 square feet for up to 90 days. It was decided that some of the campaign yard signs were too small for our needs. Kathy will continue to research the cost and type of signs for advertising the quilt show. She needs to know how many members need signs for themselves and friends.

Opportunity Quilt 2019-20 Peggy Vachon has enough strips for the quilt and showed some of the finished applique blocks.





GOOD SITTING POSTURE – Good sitting posture allows your back to do its job of supporting you. Your goal is to keep the three natural curves of your spine in their normal, balanced alignment (1). NECK RETRACTION – To realign your cervical curve, slide your chin straight back keeping your head and ears level. You should feel like you have a double chin. Repeat 5-10 times, several times throughout the day (2). NECK STRETCH – To release muscle tension in your neck, try to touch your ear to your shoulder. Be sure to keep your nose pointing forward and move slowly. Repeat 5-10 times, several times during the day (3). SHOULDER CIRCLES – To release muscle tension in your neck, shoulders, and upper back, circle your should ders backward in a wide arc. Make several circles then relax. Repeat 5-10 times throughout the day (4).




ELBOW PRESS – To release muscle tension in your middle back, bring your elbows out to the side at chest height. Press them gently backward, hesitate a moment, then release. Repeat 5-10 times, several times throughout the day or whenever you feel stiff or tired (5). MIDDLE BACK STRETCH – To realign your thoracic curve, bend both elbows and press one arm above you and the other behind you. Repeat 5-10 times, several times throughout the day (6). ABDOMINAL STRENGTHENER – Strong abdominal muscles will help support your lower back and keep it aligned. Sit with your buttocks firmly against the back of your chair and exhale and tighten your abdominal muscles for a count of 10. Release and repeat 5-10 times, several times during the day (7). BACKWARD BEND – To reverse the slouch curve and release muscle tension in your lower back, stand up, press your palms on your lower back for support, and gently bend your upper and lower back backward. Hesitate a moment, then release. Repeat 5-10 times, several times a day. Certain repetitive hand activities may put you at a higher risk for developing a variety of wrist problems. By learning how to modify how you use your hands, you may be able to reduce the risk.

 Keep your wrist in neutral. Avoid using your wrist in a bent or twisted position for long periods of time. Try to maintain your wrist in a neutral (straight) position.

• Rest your hands. Periodically give your hands a break by letting them rest briefly. You may be able to alternate easy and hard tasks, switch hands, or rotate activities.


GRIPPING – To release muscle tension in your hands, slowly make a fist then stretch your fingers out straight while spreading your fingers. Hold this position for a second then relax. Repeat 5-10 times, several times during the day (1).

THUMB STRETCH – To release muscle tension in your thumbs, stretch your thumb out to the side gently pulling on it with your opposite hand. Hold it in a stretched position for a count of 3, then release. Repeat 5-10 times, several times during the day (2).



Snow Flake Block

Presented at the January 2019 Meeting Due March 2019 AVQA Meeting Finished Block: 12 inches x 12 inches



This block is made up of 32 pieces but is very simple if you take your time.

Cutting Instructions

<u>Black:</u> Cut eight 3-7/8" by 3-7/8" squares and cut them on the diagonal to get sixteen triangles. <u>White:</u> Cut eight 3-7/8" by 3-7/8" squares and cut them on the diagonal to get sixteen triangles.

How to put this block together

I started by drawing lines within the block to make sixteen blocks so that I can see how to put this block together.

- 1. First, I chained sewed one black to a white forming a new square with all my triangles.
- 2. Next, I pressed out the squares to the dark side.
- 3. Then I formed the block.
- 4. Next I sewed the top row together pressing the seams to the right.
- 5. Sew the second row and press the seams to the left.
- 6. Sew the third row together and press the seams the right.
- 7. Now sew the fourth row together and press the seams to the left.
- 8. Now take the first and the second rows and sew them together. You should find the seams will snuggle together nicely, making straight lines.
- 9. Now do the same with the third and fourth rows. You should find the seams will snuggle together nicely, making straight lines as well.
- 10. Finally, the last step, sew the first two rows to the third and fourth rows. The seams will snuggle together nicely making straight lines as will. Warning: Do not get the rows reversed or you and your seam ripper will get well acquainted.
