She is a quilt maker, quilt lecturer-instructor, fabric artist and quilt designer. She holds a B.A. in Fine Arts, a fulltime California Teaching Credential in Textiles and Art for Adult Education and many awards for her quilts. She has been sponsored as a "One Woman" show and accepted into numerous juried quilt shows – including Houston International, Pacific International and Road to California. A special honor was the acceptance of one of her quilts designed for President Clinton with his personal note of thanks. She has lectured for quilt guilds for over 15 years.



QUILT SHOW: "Desert Garden" dates are May 21st and 22nd, 2016. QS Set up is May 20th. Sign-up sheets for working the Quilt Show will be at the March guild meeting. Please sign up! We need help from all members. Positions needed are Quilt Show Set up and Tear down, Security, Admissions, Opportunity Quilt, Raffle Basket Sales, Auction, White Glove, Vendor Helper and Helpers for the judging on Friday, May 20th.

We also need volunteers for teaching workshops for Make and Take It. The workshops will be on Saturday and Sunday of the Quilt Show. Please see Corinne Gurney or myself if you wish to volunteer.

Calling all Friendship Circles: Would you be willing to donate one basket filled with goodies for the Raffle Basket Table at the Quilt Show? Please see either Lynn Michaud or Sidney Looper.

A Quilt Show needs quilts to be a quilt show. I would love to see all your quilts this year. You make beautiful quilts, whether you are beginner, intermediate or advanced quilter.

We will be displaying wearable art this year, i.e., quilted clothing like jackets, vests and/or complete outfits. You can display your handmade purses, beach bags, and totes. This will also include home decorating items like table runners, placemats, tablecloths, tree skirts, and bed toppers. I just listed a few examples.

<u>CHATELAINE CHALLENGE 2016</u> – Machine Embroidered AVQA Logo with Participants name. \$5 Each. Embroidery donated by guild members: Kathy Greene, Patty Frozina, Sandy Smith, Mary Siemienski, and Debbie Cowles. Cheryl Nieman designed the logo. Debbie Cowles made discs for 6 embroidery machines. Monies collected will be used for prizes and printing. Logos distributed at January guild meeting. Those who did not get their logo may pick up their logos from Sue Leone at Al's Vac & Sew until Feb. Voting by guild members and award of prizes will be at the May meeting.

Voting Categories: (A) Most creative use of machine embroidery (B) Most creative use of Hand Embroidery, and (C) Most creative use of embellishments, (D) personal favorite

TWO (2) Rules to Enter Your Chatelaine in the Judging: RULE #1 – The chatelaine must have 2 pockets: (One pocket must be a WELT pocket and the Second Pocket may be maker's choice.) Welt pockets are flat and most often seen on men's suit jackets. RULE #2 – The chatelaine must have the embroidered guild logo.



Welt Pockets: Mary Siemienski demonstrated the welt pocket at the January meeting. You can also look on your computer on YouTube for simple, excellent tutorials on double welt pockets. Also another computer tutorial from Missouri Star Quilt Company describes how to sew a flat zipper into a zipper pouch.

Some embellishments: 5" ribbon pieces, rickrack, lace, trims, snaps, Velcro, charms, ribbon roses, fabric scraps, buttons, zippers, etc. Maker's choice of supplies added. Some sewing suggestions:

- 1. Use men's tie for pattern or cut (4) 5" x 25" fabric pieces for left and right sides for front and back. Mary will have some ties at guild meetings.
- 2. Taper at neck if desired to 4 1/4" if too wide.
- 3. *If making pincushion polyester batting will rust needles and pins. It is best to use wool or cotton batting.*
- 4. Make pockets on front. One must be a Welt pocket.
- 5. Pillowcase front to back in left and right sections.
- 6. Add embellishments and embroidery of your choice to hold the front and back pieces together.
- 7. Add your guild logo
- 8. Join two halves together at the neck.

AVQA Board Meeting February 16, 2016

The Meeting was called to order at 6:31 by President Carolyn Lundie.

Present at the meeting: Kathy Greene, Sue Jacobsen, Pat Stauning, Coral Brown, Jamie Harrington, Dixie Bahr, Donna Roberts, and Corine Cudney.

Motion made to approve the minutes published in the December newsletter by Sue Jacobsen. Seconded by Coral Brown. Motion approved.

<u>President's Notes:</u> Carolyn contacted High Country regarding the quilts stands they just bought. She offered to purchase any extra stands they may have.

Opportunity Quilt 2016-2017: The border is the only thing left to be completed on the opportunity quilt. Carolyn is asking friends to help spray starch the pieces to be appliqued. The goal is to have the quilt completed for the AV Fair in August.

<u>Treasurer:</u> (Kathy Greene) Kathy gave a Treasurer's report of funds as of February 2016. She commented that we are about \$3,000 short of where were at this time last year. Sue Jacobsen asked if the shortage of funds could be due to not having an Opportunity Quilt to sell tickets. Discussion followed and most agreed that could be the reason for the majority of the shortage of funds.

1st Vice President: (Sue Jacobsen) Sent contract to Lola Newman for April and Linda Kerston will be doing a trunk show in August. Sue also spoke with Tiffany Hayes about being a speaker in the future.

<u>2nd Vice President:</u> (Jamie Harrington) Need to find a place to put the Opportunity Quilt together. Carolyn

suggested St. Paul's Episcopal Church and Sue Jacobsen offered her garage, which has 4 tables to use. Jamie now has to decide where. We now have 13 quilt vendors for the quilt show. Jamie will be sending letters out to the crafters now.

Quilt show meeting at Jamie's home in Rosamond, February 23rd at 6:30 p.m.

<u>Parliamentarian:</u> (Harriet Spann) Harriet was not present at the meeting but reported to Carolyn that she has nominees for all AVQA board positions for the 2016-17 <u>except treasurer.</u>

<u>Hospitality:</u> (Rosie Cuevas) Pat Stauning stated that more funds were needed for hospitality. Sue Jacobsen made a motion to move \$50 from the Emergency Fund to Hospitality. Donna Roberts seconded. Motion passed.

Old Business

Carolyn had asked Dixie Bahr to research bookkeeping/ accounting programs for the guild. She reported the following: QuickBooks online is the safest. It does not offer budgeting, but she does not feel that is a problem because that could be done in Excel as we have done in the past. Her argument for QB, even without budgeting data security is a foremost concern. QB online lives in the Cloud, and it can be accessed from any computer and have multiple users with password protection. Since the treasurer is a rotating position, ease of use and transferring authority is a factor. Audit reports can be run that would show who made entry and when. Can track all expenses, pretty much like a check register. Cost of this program is \$12.95 a month with all updates free. Discussion followed.

Sue Jacobsen made a motion that we subscribe to QuickBooks online and that AVQA put together a team of 3 people who set up and train on QuickBooks. Also, the current treasurer does not have to change the way she keeps records now. Kathy Greene seconded. Motion approved.

Meeting adjourned at 7:07 p.m.

A Friendly message from your SCCQG rep:

This month's journey took me to Lemon Grove which is in San Diego County. What a pretty area. What a drive. The business meeting was about guilds filing insurance requests electronically. If a guild hosts SCCOG meeting, they will receive a check for \$500. There was a reminder when your guild adds their show to the calendar to contact the webmaster. It is good free advertisement. The program was Procedure Books and how important it can be for your guild. Everyone that has a job can use a procedure book. It helps make improvements, easy transition for new volunteers, a place to have a list of forms, ballots, inventories, and materials used during any events, job descriptions, duties, timelines, meeting layouts, agenda samples, how to conduct a meeting, and anything that makes a guild run smoothly. It will help the new program chair work an event or job. You can even keep the procedures on a web site but only have one person in charge for editing. You can start a procedure book by making an outline of the job duties. Guilds can check other guilds for ideas by asking questions through emails. You can keep everything on a thumb drive or notebooks and have the librarian or parliamentarian in charge of them. Main thing is to have a back-up copy of all procedures. You should update the books every two to three years and clean out obsolete notes. Keep the obsolete items in another book, it can be use a references, as an example vendor list from old quilt's shows or previous speakers. After the meeting, I went to Rosie's Calico Cupboard which is a great quilt shop in San Diego.

Tip of the Month

My hand hurts. Actually one of my fingers has been hurting for quite some time so I researched on potential hand injuries that quilters may face.

There's a good book available called <u>RX for</u> <u>Quilters: Stitcher-Friendly Advice for Every Body</u> by Susan Delaney-Mech. I will be donating the book to the guild library.

There's tons of good information in the book, but I wanted to focus on Rotary Cutters. The author talks of a study done on injuries suffered by pizza makers who were using rotary cutters with narrow handles that would press into the soft tissues of their palms. Some of these pizza makers developed paralysis of their thumbs and index fingers as a result of the trauma to a nerve in their palm. When they started using a padded rotary cutter, the nerve damage was reversed since the padded rotary cutter spreads the force of cutting over a wider area of the hand.

Luckily, newer rotary cutters have larger padded handles and should not cause too many issues. If you have an old rotary cutter – I recommend just getting a new one, but if that is not possible, try wrapping the handle in padded handlebar tape or the author suggests using a padded, fingerless bicycling gloves when you cut.

Taking care of your rotary cutter can reduce the amount of strain on your hand, arm, and/or shoulder. Suggestions include using your larger-sized blades for cutting strips, replace your blades often (if you can't afford to replace your blades, resharpen them), and loosen the blade a little if it doesn't roll easily.

Finally – think about your cutting mat. Like everything else revolving around quilting, there are many opinions on what cutting mat is the best. Perhaps before you invest in a new mat, borrow one from a quilting bud or ask to use someone else's mat during a workshop. Sometimes having the right mat will reduce strain of rotary cutting!

There is a lot of great information in this book!



Fish Block

Due at the March AVQA Meeting

Finished Block: 12 1/2" by 12 1/2"



This block will use any fabric that reads blue for the background and the fish can be made from the same fabric or from some other fabric.

Cutting Instructions

Fish fabric of your choice:

- 1. Cut one 8 ½ by 8 ½ inch square.
- 2. Cut three 4 7/8 by 4 7/8 inch squares and cut them on the diagonal, forming two triangles.

Background fabric that reads blue:

1. Cut three 4 7/8 by 4 7/8 inch squares and cut them on the diagonal, forming two triangles.

How to assemble the block

- 1. Join five of the background triangles with the fin triangles to form squares.
- 2. Using the picture join the top and the second fin down to form a rectangle.
- 3. Join the rectangle you just formed to the main body of the fish.
- 4. Join the three squares to each other watching the picture to get the orientation correct.
- 5. Now for the tricky part. Sew the bottom row of fins to the main part of the fish matching the left seams up. Take your time with this. I put the seam to the top seam to the body of the fish and the bottom to the other side.

Try this with a friend and just have fun!!!

2016 AVQA QUILT SHOW ENTRY RULES & JUDGING GUIDELINES

- 1. AVQA MEMBERS may enter quilts for judging or for exhibition.
- 2. Quilts judged in previous AVQA shows cannot be entered again, except by invitation or exhibition, only.
- 3. Entrant must be the maker of the entry to be judged.
- 4. Multiple entries by the same entrant will be hung as space permits.
- 5. Each quilt entry requires a separate entry form with a photograph attached. The photograph may be of a quilt in progress (unfinished). Photo can be taken at the April meeting during the break.
- 6. DEADLINE FOR REGISTRATION IS THURSDAY, APRIL 14th at the GUILD MEETING. The entry forms will be published in the March newsletter and may be reproduced. Forms will also be available at Guild meetings. **WE NEED YOUR ENTRIES BY APRIL 14TH**.
- 7. Quilts must be finished, clean, and free of odors and pet hair.
- 8. A four-inch sleeve is required on all quilts except small quilts. Quilts wider than 110 inches cannot be hung on AVQA quilt stands unless folded and draped over the rod.
- 9. All quilts should have a cloth label sewn on the back. The entrant's name and the quilt's name should be included. Names on the quilts will be covered during judging.
- 10. Quilts that are to be judged must be delivered to the Antelope Valley Fairgrounds on Friday, May 20th, 2016, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. only. Exhibit Only quilts may be delivered until 5:00 p.m. Receipts will be provided with each entry.
- 11. The facility will be closed during the "take down" process of the show to all except to those who are working.
- 12. Quilts may be picked up at the checkout station between 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 22nd, 2016. BRING YOUR RECEIPT. For security purposes, no entries may be removed from the facility without going through the checkout station.

JUDGED QUILTS

GUIDELINES: Small/Medium = up to 48 inches wide; Large = 49 inches wide and above. Judges reserve the right to move, split, or combine categories dependent on number of entries received.

PIECED QUILT: A quilt is considered to be pieced if the piecing is predominant over all other techniques.

APPLIQUED QUILT: A quilt is considered to be machine appliqued if both machine and hand applique techniques are used. A quilt is considered to be hand appliqued when ALL of the applique work is done by hand.

MODERN QUILT: A 'modern quilt' is a quilt inspired by modern design, including some of the following characteristics: the use of bold colors and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid color, improvisational piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work; can include 'modern traditionalism or the updating of classic quilt designs.

GROUP QUILT: A quilt with a top that has been constructed by two or more people. Examples of this type of quilt are round robin, block exchange, or a quilt made by a friendship circle.

SPECIALTY TECHNIQUES: Machine or hand quilted entries using predominantly specialty techniques such as cross stitch, embroidery including redwork, stenciling, painting, trapunto, whole cloth, crazy quilting, cathedral window, yo-yo, and rag quilts. This includes quilts that do not fit into the Applique or Pieced categories, and include quilts made using innovative techniques of construction, design and embellishment such as used in pictorial quilts, abstract quilts, Snippets, and quilts of original design using innovative piecing or applique techniques.

WEARABLE ART/OTHER Wearable Art: the piece must be intended to be worn as a garment or fashion accessory, i.e., hat, belt, purse, vest, scarf. The item must contain recognizable quilting. Other: this can include quilted items such as pillows, placemats, table runners, dolls and other stitched toys, tree skirts, Christmas stockings, sewing machine covers, and tea cozies.

FIRST TIME ENTRANT: This is the first time the member has entered a quilt for judging in an AVQA quilt show.

BEST HAND QUILTING: Must be submitted for judging by the person who did the hand quilting.

BEST MACHINE QUILTING: Must be submitted for judging by the person who did the quilting, whether nonprofessional or professional.
