Parliamentarian – By-Law Changes

The proposed by-law changes were included with the December newsletter and will be included with the January newsletter also. Voting on the proposed changes will occur at the February meeting.

Philanthropic

Despite taking a bit of a break from Philanthropic efforts during December, the guild still managed to donate shelter quilts to the Lancaster animal shelter and to fire victims from the large Thomas fire in the Ventura/Santa Barbara area. A total of 16 quilts and 7 fleece baby blankets finished with crochet were donated to the Super Buzzy quilt shop in Ventura. We would like to continue to support the fire victims as many, many people lost their homes and are still displaced. Please bring donation items to the January meeting and we will put them to good use.

Here is the message from SuperBuzzy Quilt Shop on what they are looking for.

Bed-size quilts: Please send completed quilts in twin, full, queen, and king sizes in any design.

Quilt tops: If you have a completed quilt top, but don't have the time to complete it, we will help to get it finished and distributed to someone in need.

Quilt Blocks: In conjunction with the Ventura Modern Quilt Guild, we are accepting donations of the Perkiomen Valley Block: <u>http://www.venturamodernquiltguild.com/2</u> <u>017/12/11/thomas-fire-blocks/</u> Ventura Modern Quilt Guild members will work to assemble the blocks into completed quilts. We invite other quilt guilds to donate individual blocks, or to work collaboratively to create quilt tops and/or completed quilts. For quilts made from the Perkiomen Valley Blocks, we are asking for a 72" x 84" finished quilt (42 blocks total per quilt).

Pre-Cut Fabric: The Perkiomen Valley Block uses 5" fabric squares. If you are unable to sew blocks, but you have 5" or 10" charm packs or squares of quilt shop quality fabric to donate, we will gladly accept them and assemble them into quilt tops. You can do this 2 ways: send your own charm packs or squares, or purchase a charm pack or layer cake through our website for the Thomas Fire relief quilts.

Quilt Backing: We will need large cuts of fabric to back the unfinished quilts. Please send quilt shop quality fabrics in cuts of 4 yards or larger for quilt backs. Extra-wide fabrics (108" wide fabric) are high on the wish list!

Batting: We will need batting for the unfinished quilts. Please send bed size (twin, full, queen and/or king) batting to help us complete the quilts.

Thread: We will need a lot of thread to piece and quilt these quilts, and we welcome donations of good quality, new cotton thread in 40 or 50 weight.

Pillowcases: please send standard size pillowcases for children and adults. The Roll It Up pattern and tutorial <u>http://www.allpeoplequilt.com/millionpillo</u> <u>wcases/instructions/RollItUp.pdf</u> is quick and fun to make. Also, we are still pursuing our goal of making pillowcases for the senior citizen residents at Harshfield Terrace. Pillowcase donations are accepted. There will also be plenty of pillowcase kits available at the January meeting.

Philanthropic had a very successful first half of the guild year, and we hope that the last half will be even more successful. If you haven't yet contributed, please consider doing so, and if you've already contributed – thank you so very much!!!

Anyone wanting to help with Philanthropic is welcome to join Bits & Pieces Friendship Circle for Saturday Sewing on January 6th from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Harshfield Terrace. They will be meeting there the first Saturday of each month if you can't make it in January.

Tip of the Month

Day to Day

Use your cover – prevent dust, lint, dirt, and pet's fur from infiltrating your machine by covering it when not in use.

Troubleshooting*

Tension:

 Poor thread tension often comes from an incorrectly inserted needle. Machine needles have a flat side that should always face the back of the sewing machine. Check that the bobbin is wound correctly. It shouldn't have any loose threads or loops sticking out. Always use an empty bobbin.

Change Your Needle

Suggestions vary from every 8 hours to whenever you complete a project. Also you might want to change your needle to match the weave and weight of your fabric.



Clean Your Machine

You should consistently clean your machine yourself after every extensive sewing project.

Step 1: Raise the presser foot to loose tension springs, then run folded piece of muslin between tension discs to dislodge lint and loose threads.

Step 2: Remove throat plate, bobbin, and bobbin case.

Step 3: Use small lint brush to dust under the feed dogs and around the bobbin area.

Step 4: Spray tension discs, under feed dogs, and around bobbin areas with compressed air to remove any excess lint and thread. Avoid introducing any moisture into your machine by holding the compressed air can at least 4 inches away.



You will also want to spray with the nozzle angled away from the parts you are cleaning, so as to blow lint out rather than further into the machine.

Why not just blow with your own breath? Your breath contains moisture and will eventually cause erosion damage to your machine.

A Note on Canned Air: "Compressed" or "canned" air is actually fluorocarbon gases that are compressed into liquids. These gases are ozone safe but are potential greenhouse gases. When using these products, you may notice the can become quite cold if used for an extensive cleaning. At this point, less gas is produced. Set the can aside and wait for it to return to room temperature.

Step 5: Follow your sewing machine's guide to oiling your machine.

Professional Servicing - Annually

A good service person adjusts tension and timing during regular service, as well as cleaning areas of the machine that you cannot reach without taking the machine completely apart.
