I fell into quilting after it no longer became lucrative for me to make clothes for my children or myself. Traditional piecing was my comfort zone, but then I branched out into traditional cotton appliqué, then appliquéing with wool and enhancing it with embroidery stitches. I

also love exploring art with pictorial quilts. My newest ventures are designing my first two quilt patterns, called "Red, White, and Bloom" and "Texas Strong." I am currently teaching a Beginning Quilting Class at Saddleback

College for Community Education in Mission Viejo, CA.

I have been fortunate to win multiple awards in our local quilt guild shows, Road to California, Nashville AQS, Grand Rapids AQS, and Paducah. My quilts have been exhibited in Houston International Quilt Show, with one being a red and white quilt that was part of the "Ruby Jubilee" Quilt Exhibit at Houston 2014 and traveled for more than a year to different venues. Two of my quilts have been published in "Quilters Newsletter," "Quilt Mania," and American Quilter Magazine."



Opportunity Quilt Design

I have volunteered to be the Opportunity Quilt Design chairperson for 2018-19. This quilt will be constructed over the course of this year and be completed and debuted at the June meeting in 2019. This quilt will be the Opportunity Quilt for 2019-2020! I want every member in this guild to help out. How can you help? First of all I need everyone to visually picture in your mind the map of Southern California. This is what I want to represent in fabric, thread, quilting and embellishments.

The <u>FIRST STEP</u> in this quilt will be the background. For the background, I ask that everyone who knows how to sew submit a strip pieced section that will be used in many ways in our background.

Cut strips out of your stash any length. You may choose to use the whole width of fabric (WOF) or a fat quarter. The choice of fabric is your choice! All I ask is that you use that vision you have of the Southern California map that I mentioned earlier. Imagine just a part of the map. Think of the colors of that part. Is it ocean that you are imagining? Then I need you to make a strip set that only includes the colors of the ocean in it. Whether it is the deep ocean of dark navy blues or the shallow sections of the ocean that are pale blue mixed with white from the waves, I need you to concentrate on that one part of the ocean that you want to represent. Please construct either a "strip set" of dark blue, medium blue, or light blues mixed with surf and sand. I need these strip sets to include many strips of the one color. You may choose to exchange fabrics with your friends or circle to achieve a nice variety of kinds of fabrics and colors. It is important to iron your seams open. It is also important to use only what you have on hand and only use "Quilt Shop" quality fabric.

We need strip sets in many colors. Representing the ocean as I have mentioned above, we need blues. Representing the mountains, we need strip sets in evergreen, dark brown, or even white. For our farmlands and continuous fertile land we need greens of every color. We have deserts that range from beige of the sand to rusts of the red rock canyons. If you can, please make these strip sets cut from 3/4", 1", 1 1/4", and 11/2" strips of fabric. A variety of these sizes mixed together will be the optimum. Remember to iron the seams open.

Why do I ask you to iron the strip sets open? That is the second part of our quilt design. We will be adding all types of appliqué to the top of these multicolored strips of glorious fabric. Without your help of constructing the background and donating a little bit of your stash and a little bit of your time and imagination, we will not be able to have a place for the appliqué to be applied.

Applique? This is the **SECOND STEP** of your Opportunity Quilt. I need help from EVERYONE to think of a place in Southern California that you have visited or have a specific memory from or even a memory from a relative when they arrived in California. Our map of SoCal needs more than just a topical map of stripped pieces. We need destinations. We need representations of a specific spot, in the form of an object that can be applied on top of our background. Imagine our ocean as above. On top of our deep ocean we could have a blue whale, a cargo ship, and a pod of dolphins. Our deserts need specific wildflowers or an animal to represent an area. Our mountains have bears, chipmunks, fir trees and redwoods. Our cities have interests, also. We have many, many cities! We cannot represent them all, but we can represent those important to you.

I need EVERY member to come up with 3 ideas for our quilt. Please submit to me a name of a city and an object that could represent that city. Example: Santa Monica = Ferris Wheel. I need each member to suggest an animal and a flower/tree.

Step one: Please email, text, or call me with your 3 ideas. margaretvachon@verizon.net, phone number in roster.

Step two: Please sew skinny strips of a variety of one color at least 7" wide X 7" long with seams ironed open.

<u>Step three</u>: Let me know if you can help in any way. We all need to make this quilt. It is YOUR quilt. Please tell me if you can machine embroider or hand applique, and/or just willing to help in any way. This will be a completely originally designed quilt. There will not be any other quilt like this. I am excited about this and I hope you are too!

Tip of the Month



Let's Go on a Fabric Diet!

A current trend is for quilters to go on a "Fabric Diet" – time to shed some weight from their fabric stashes. For some, it is about the expense of fabric or storage, but for many it is about how having too much fabric affects their creativity. Here are some suggestions on how to go on a "Fabric Diet."

- 1. Get rid of what you know you won't use. There's something helpful and productive about purging what you no longer love or what's no longer your style. That subpar fabric can affect how you see all the other good and usable stuff in your stash. Any castoffs can be offered to friends, donated to charity, or put up on Instagram or Facebook and sent to a new home. This past February, I gave some of my unwanted fabric to my guild's annual yard sale.
- 2. Start with your stash when planning a project. It's easy to home in on a new quilt design and immediately think that a trip to the quilt shop is in order. When I start playing around with my stash, though, I'm amazed by the potential. Sure, I may need to augment a fabric pull with a new solid or two, but the bulk of many quilt tops can be found in my stash. Precuts and bundles are especially easy to use up—they're made to coordinate and require fewer new purchases.

- 3. Buy what you need when you need it. When embarking on a new project, only buy what that project requires after you've confirmed that you don't have a suitable substitute in your stash. I prefer to buy local when possible so I don't have to order minimum cuts—which are sometimes a full yard!—from an online retailer. Some more advice on this front: Don't buy too far in advance. If you're like me, your to-do list will likely change and you'll find yourself with fabric cuts you no longer need. Also, be wary of free shipping deals online. Sometimes, it's better to pay five bucks shipping than add unneeded fabric to your shopping cart just to avoid shipping charges.
- **4. Identify your weakness(es).** How are you likely to blow this fabric diet? Are you a social fabric buyer, someone who heads out with friends for some fabric shopping and lunch on a Saturday morning? Then invite your friends to your house to sew instead. Do you find yourself perusing #thegreatfabricdestash posts on Instagram or getting sucked into browsing fabric sales online? Then unfollow the necessary people or shops, and unsubscribe to retailers' email lists.
- **5. Give yourself some wiggle room.** It's hard to be good all the time. Decide on some healthy parameters for shopping at fabric stores. If you're going on a quilt retreat and fabric shopping is on the agenda, determine up front how much you'll spend shopping. If you're dieting for a nonfinancial reason, try splurging on something other than fabric, like a fabric-cutting machine, quilting services, or high-quality thread.
