Lujean studied textile design at Long Beach State University in the early 70's. She completed her B.A. in Fine Arts. Early years were devoted to creative weaving and graphic design; then she migrated towards quilting!

She has a California Teaching Credential in Textiles and Art for Adult Education. She has been teaching, lecturing and doing workshops for the past 25 years. (More info @ Lujeanquilt.com.)

She will be talking about both quilting and how to use borders to frame your quilts. OK, I am known for putting a single piece of fabric on the sides of something I have spent hours piecing. Maybe I will try something new.

We had a great class with Tina Curren. I, Nette Louton, stepped outside my comfort zone and changed the pattern to something I would use. I know you know me as a Kit and Pattern girl. Meeting called to order at 5:37 pm at Bolts in the Bathtub by President Kathy Greene being in the chair. Carolyn Lundie acting as Secretary.

Minutes: Approval of January board minutes as published in newsletter. Motion proposed by Nette Louton. Seconded by Yvonne Rodriquez.

Presidents Report/Kathy Greene announced vacancies for Executive board positions next year: 2nd VP Quilt Show, Secretary, Parliamentarian. Committee Chairs available are Philanthropic and Publicity. Please promote the guild every chance you can.

Programs & Challenge/Nette Louton reported Tina Curren gave a great program and workshop. She may be back to teach the herringbone flag next year. Lujean Seagal will present the March program, "Quilting Makes the Quilt," and the workshop, "Beyond Boring Borders." Corinne Gurney will present a program and workshop on wearable art. The June program will be Janis Rivera, "Collage Quilting Without Falling to Pieces."

Members will be given more time this year to view the Suffragette Challenge quilts in April. Karen Stenback has been asked to explain to quilt show entrants at a guild meeting how quilts are chosen for categories for the quilt show.

2nd VP Quilt Show/Kathy Greene for Jamie Harrington Sandra Smith will be in charge of check-in and check-out for quilts at the Quilt Show. Quilt Show meeting will be Feb. 25 at 3:00 pm at Jamie's house.

Treasurer's Report/Stephanie Shuping got approval to deposit checks from Karen Stocking from last year's budget using the emergency fund. Also, expenses from the Art Quilt show will be

taken out of the emergency fund. Stephanie explained the problem with the treasurer's report not being printed accurately in the newsletter.

Corinne Gurney/UFO CHALLENGE The 2019 Challenge has concluded and the 2020 UFO Challenge has commenced. **TRAVEL** Thirty-seven people have signed up for the bus to the Glendale Quilt Show on March 28. Forty are needed to fill the bus. The Hoffman tour is April 17 with 28 people registering. She will request a bus for the Long Beach Quilt Show in July.

PARLIAMENTARIAN Corinne is gathering a nominating committee for the Executive Board. There are conflicting reports regarding whether AVC is discontinuing the Clothing and Textiles Department which affects the administration of the Scholarship award. She will offer 3 options for the Scholarship By-Laws change in the newsletter: a) accept proposed amendment as published; b) accept Karen Stocking's proposal to choose recipients of MOAH's student art exhibit; c) give scholarship funds to the programs budget. QUILT DESIGN 2020-21 Meeting at Bolts in the Bathtub at 10:30 on Thursday to apply motifs.

Publicity- Yvonne Rodriquez wanted to know which budget category two receipts from Bohn's should be charged. Pat Stauning will be submitting two months of Quilt Show ads in AV Lifestyle for \$50 each. Yvonne is postponing ordering business cards until she is sure there is enough money in the publicity budget.

Opportunity Quilt Promotion/Donna Roberts is asking that members bring water to the general meetings as the ice machine at the church is broken. She has ordered 1000 more opportunity quilt tickets. The quilt will be taken to Bakersfield February 28th and 29th. The quilt will be at the Glendale show on March 14 and the Camarillo/Ventura Quilt show April 25th.

New Business/President Greene asked board members to consider where we should have the June Changeover meeting.



By-Laws Review

The by-laws were reviewed by the following members – Pat Crook, Nette Louton, Sandy Smith and Corinne Gurney (Parliamentarian).

Due to the AVC having dropped the Fiber Arts program from their curriculum, this by-law has to be changed. I did confirm with the college that the program has been discontinued. The by-laws committee and the current scholarship committee (consisting of Karen Stocking, Jamie Harrington

and Evelyn Tiede) met to decide on a change. After discussing the issue with them, the board and the feedback from other guild members, we are making the following recommendations. We will be presenting 2 choices for your vote to the change in the by-laws. We will be using a written ballot on the day we vote. Here are the 2 choices:

Option 1. The Scholarship chairman shall:

A. Choose two other guild members to be on the committee.

B. Scholarships will be given to any interested individual who submits to the MOAH/Cedar Annual Juried Art Exhibit and Cederfest Annual Antelope Valley Union High School Art Show. She/he must live in the Antelope Valley and create art using fibers and qualify according to the specified criteria set by the MOAH/Cedar center. Cedarfest is open to all High School Students.

C. The committee will pick the recipients.

Option 2. The Scholarship committee will be dissolved since there is no longer a an AVC program and the funds be transferred to the Programs/Education budget.



Rails and Triangles

Presented at the January 2020 Meeting **Due at the March 2020 Meeting**Finished Block: 12 ½ inch by 12 ½ inch



This block is made up of a novelty cotton print and a white or white-on-white cotton print. All seams are sewn using ¼ inch seam allowance.

Cutting Instructions:

Novelty Cotton Print

Cut one 4 1/2" by 4 1/2" square

Cut two 5" by 5" squares. Then cut each square into two triangles by cutting them on the diagonal.

Cut one 1 7/8" strip WOF (width of fabric)

White or White-on-White Cotton Print

Cut two 1 7/8" strips WOF (width of fabric)

Cut two 5" by 5" squares. Then cut each square into two triangles by cutting them on the diagonal.

To Assemble the Block:

We are going to make a strip of three rail fences by sewing the white fabric to novelty fabric.

- 1. Sew the novelty fabric to the white fabric so the novelty print is next to white fabric.
- 2. Press to the dark side.
- 3. Trim the rows so they are all even and then cut the rows into $4\frac{1}{2}$ " strips. This will give you the three rail fences.
- 4. Now sew the triangles together, white to novelty print, and press to the dark side.
- 5. Trim the new squares to $4\frac{1}{2}$ " by $4\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 6. Use the picture to set up the block for sewing. Setting the rail fences so the print is upright on the left, (rotate 90 degrees) sideways on the top,(rotate 90 degrees) upside down,(rotate 90 degrees) on the right side and once again (rotate 90 degrees) sideways on the bottom of the block.
- 7. Now sew the top and press to the right, the middle and press to the left, and the bottom of the block together and press to the right again. This will help in the final line-up of the block.
- 8. To finish the block, sew the top strip to the middle, and the middle to the bottom strip.

9. Have FUN with the block!!!!!

Entries are due by the April 9th guild meeting to allow enough time to prepare the spreadsheet, quilt legends, and the program prior to the show.

2020 AVQA QUILT SHOW ENTRY RULES & JUDGING GUIDELINES

- 1. AVQA MEMBERS current as of January 1, 2020, may enter quilts for judging or exhibition only. AVQA MEMBERS who join after January 1, 2020, may enter quilts for exhibition only.
- 2. Quilts judged in previous AVQA shows cannot be entered again except by invitation or for exhibition only.
- 3. Entrant must be the maker of the entry to be judged or approved as "special circumstance."
- 4. Multiple entries by the same entrant will be hung as space permits.
- 5. Each quilt entry requires a separate entry form with a photograph attached. The photograph may be of a quilt in progress (unfinished). Photo can be taken at the April meeting during the break.
- 6. **DEADLINE FOR REGISTRATION IS THURSDAY, APRIL 9th.** Entry forms will be published in the newsletter, and electronic forms will be on the AVQA website. Forms will also be available at Guild meetings. WE NEED YOUR ENTRY FORMS BY APRIL 9TH TO ALLOW US TIME TO PREPARE THE SPREADSHEET, LEGENDS & PROGRAM.
- 7. Quilts must be finished, clean, and free of odors and pet hair.
- 8. A four-inch sleeve is required on all quilts except small quilts. Quilts wider than 110 inches cannot be hung on AVQA quilt stands unless folded and draped over the rod.
- 9. Quilts must have a label sewn on the back with entrant's & quilt's name. Names will be covered for judging. 10. Quilts that are to be judged must be delivered to the Antelope Valley Fairgrounds on Friday, May 15, between 8:00 & 9:45 a.m. Exhibit Only quilts may be delivered between 8:00 a.m. & 2:00 p.m. Alternate check-in arrangements may be made by contacting Karen Stenback or Sandy Smith.
- 11. The facility will be closed during the take down process of the show to all except to those who are working.
- 12. Quilts may be picked up at the checkout station between 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 17. For security purposes, entries may only be removed from the facility through the checkout station.

JUDGED QUILTS

GUIDELINES: Judges reserve the right to move, split, or combine categories dependent on number of entries received.

SIZES: Wall (Small) quilt: Maximum of 40 inches on one side. (This does not include table runners, which are in the Applied Art category); **Medium:** Maximum of 60 inches in width and 80 inches in length; **Large:** Minimum of 80 inches in width and 90 inches in length.

ONE PERSON: Must be made by one individual entirely, including pieced, quilted, bound.

TWO PERSON: Must be the work of two people (one may do the piecing and one may do the quilting).

GROUP: Three or more persons must have been involved in the assembly and quilting of the piece. Examples are round robin, block exchange, or made by a friendship circle. Can be any technique.

PIECED QUILT: A quilt is considered to be pieced if the piecing is predominant over all other techniques. **APPLIQUÉD QUILT:** A quilt is considered to appliqued if the main technique (50% or more) of the quilt top is applique. Other techniques may be used, but must support the main technique, which is applique.

BALANCED PIECING & APPLIQUÉ: A combination of appliqué and piecing techniques are used to form the quilt top. Both techniques must contribute to the over-all design. The quilt must contain a noticeable and significant amount of both.

MODERN QUILT: A "modern quilt" is a quilt inspired by modern design, including some of the following characteristics: the use of bold colors and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid color, improvisational piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work; can include modern traditionalism or the updating of classic quilt designs.

KIT QUILTS AND BLOCK OF THE MONTH: These quilts are packaged in kit form with additional fabrics or embellishments provided by the maker. They may be put together by one person and quilted by another. They may be any size or technique.

SPECIALTY TECHNIQUES: Machine or hand-quilted entries using predominantly specialty techniques such as cross stitch, embroidery including red work, stenciling, painting, trapunto, whole cloth, crazy quilting, cathedral window, yo-yo, and rag quilts. This includes quilts that do not fit into the Applique or Pieced categories, and include quilts made using innovative techniques of construction, design and embellishment such

as those used in pictorial quilts, abstract quilts, snippets, collage, and quilts of original design using innovative piecing or applique techniques.

ART QUILT: Mixed media or fiber art. Art form that uses both modern and traditional quilting techniques to create art objects - "a creative work that is layered and stitched or references a form of stitched layered structure."

MINIATURE QUILT: A traditional quilt pattern that is miniaturized to a maximum of 24 inches on a side, with the maximum block size at 4 inches square.

APPLIED ARTS: Wearable art, pillows, placemats, table runners, tree skirts, Christmas stockings, sewing machine covers, and tea cozies, etc. The item must contain recognizable quilting.
