Minutes: The motion to approve the minutes as published was proposed by Pat Crook and seconded by Nette Louton. Motion passed.

President's Report/Kathy Greene thanked everyone for coming. She appreciated the support. "Thank you for making AVQA as great as it for everyone and for me. It feels like a large friendship group. Remember to respect everyone's opinion."

Programs/Nette Louton Rami Kim's workshop was reported as a great workshop. Philanthropic

Philanthropic Committee Chairperson needed!!

Coral, Antoinette, and I have enjoyed our time as the Philanthropic Committee; however, we are in our 3rd year and would like to focus on other things in our lives and will not be continuing. A new Chairperson or Chairpersons are needed. It is better for friends to do this as a team. What does the Philanthropic Committee Chairperson job entail, you ask? Really it can be whatever you want it to be. We have chosen to focus on quilts for foster kids for the most part and have used a simple, achievable pattern. BUT we haven't limited ourselves to that. The guild has made pillowcases, animal shelter quilts, shopping bags, larger quilts, and baby flannel hearts for various charities or in support of natural disasters such as fires, hurricanes and earthquakes. We have chosen to cut quilts into kits and bundle quilts, backs and batting for quilting; however, that is optional. There is no set agenda or quota to fulfill. The guild should have some level of Philanthropic support out to the community, but there is no specific guidance or expectation outside of a few things in the by-laws. The Philanthropic Committee can be as successful as we want it to be with persistence and solid planning. And more participation by the members! We have also partnered with Harshfield Terrace Residential Community who allow us to use their facility for our monthly sewing for free. This helps

them meet their non-profit, community support requirement, so it is a win-win for both organizations. Because I work during the week, we hold monthly Philanthropic sewing days on the first Saturday of the month, but that is also optional. Ideally, the new chairperson(s) would continue this partnership with Harshfield, but it is not mandatory. Also, in the spirit of full disclosure, the new Philanthropic Chairperson(s) will need to be able to store a good amount of fabric and batting. I have the guild's fabric in a single bay garage, and it probably takes up a good 50-60% of the garage. Coral has many items at her house as well. You will need space, or the guild needs to come up with a plan for the fabric and batting. Coral and I can transport it anywhere. Also, distributing the quilts or other items to the charities is a big job. Fortunately, we have had Antoinette's dedication as she has driven all over the valley delivering items. She has notes on all the different charities, hospitals, women's and animal shelters that we have given to as well as names and phone numbers for the new Chairperson(s).

The best part of being the Philanthropic Chairpersons is helping our guild contribute to the community. We have also had so much fun getting to know the guild members who chose to contribute and give up their time to help others. I sleep better knowing I have helped make a difference even if it is just a moment of comfort that a quilt might bring to someone in need.

The bus will be meeting us all at the Park and Ride parking lot on Avenue S just west of the 14 freeway at 8:45 am. The show opens at 10:00am.


Hoffman Trip

Rails and Triangles

Presented at the January 2020 Meeting **Due at the March 2020 Meeting** Finished Block: 12 ½ inch by 12 ½ inch



This block is made up of a novelty cotton print and a white or white-on-white cotton print. All seams are sewn using ¹/₄ inch seam allowance.

Cutting Instructions:

Novelty Cotton Print

Cut one $4\frac{1}{2}$ " by $4\frac{1}{2}$ " square

Cut two 5" by 5" squares. Then cut each square into two triangles by cutting them on the diagonal. Cut one 1.7/8" strip WOF (width of fabric)

White or White-on-White Cotton Print

Cut two 1 7/8" strips WOF (width of fabric)

Cut two 5" by 5" squares. Then cut each square into two triangles by cutting them on the diagonal.

To Assemble the Block:

We are going to make a strip of three rail fences by sewing the white fabric to novelty fabric.

- 1. Sew the novelty fabric to the white fabric so the novelty print is next to white fabric.
- 2. Press to the dark side.
- 3. Trim the rows so they are all even and then cut the rows into $4\frac{1}{2}$ " strips. This will give you the three rail fences.
- 4. Now sew the triangles together, white to novelty print, and press to the dark side.
- 5. Trim the new squares to $4\frac{1}{2}$ " by $4\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 6. Use the picture to set up the block for sewing. Setting the rail fences so the print is upright on the left,(rotate 90 degrees) sideways on the top,(rotate 90 degrees) upside down,(rotate 90 degrees) on the right side and once again (rotate 90 degrees) sideways on the bottom of the block.
- 7. Now sew the top and press to the right, the middle and press to the left and the bottom of the block together and press to the right again. This will help in the final line up of the block.
- 8. To finish the block, sew the top strip to the middle, and the middle to the bottom strip.

9. Have FUN with the block!!!!!
